Library Spruce-Up: Sometime before the end of the year the library will be undertaking a long overdue sprucing-up project to better serve our patrons. This will involve a drastic rearranging of the space in addition to new paint and carpet. Village Ordinance states that it is unlawful to rake leaves into the street. We are asking for the cooperation of all our residents:



PLEASE DO NOT RAKE LEAVES INTO THE STREETS!!



They block the sewers, plug the drains, cause damage to the street sweeper and create a safety hazard when wet or frost-covered.

There is a compost pile located behind Ultimate Coatings in the Industrial Park, which is on the west side of town off Highway 29. This is for brush, leaves and grass only - absolutely NO garbage, building materials, furniture, etc. Do not put these items in bags.

***** PARKING RESTRICTIONS *****

Spring Valley Police Department Reminder:

Winter parking restrictions will go into effect on Friday, November 1st, 2013. Village Ordinance does not allow vehicles to be parked on Village streets between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. Officers will be issuing parking tickets to vehicles parked illegally during these hours, regardless of snowfall. This means parking will be enforced every night of the week between November 1st and March 31st. If your car experiences a mechanical difficulty, you must contact an Officer to avoid a parking ticket.



Shoveling

Pursuant to 38-150 of the Village Code of Ordinances, the owner, occupant or person in charge of any lot which fronts or adjoins a sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk clear of all snow and ice. If snow accumulates on a sidewalk due to natural means and/or by any other means, the sidewalk shall be cleared of all the accumulated snow and/or ice within 24 hours from the time the snow ceases to accumulate on the sidewalk. Sidewalks are to be kept clear of snow and ice to a minimum of four feet in width. If ice has formed on a sidewalk in such a way that it cannot be removed, the owner, occupant or person in charge of the sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk sprinkled with sand and/or salt to permit safe travel by pedestrians.

If you do not follow the above ordinance, the Village will remove the snow and/or ice for you at a minimum charge of \$100.00.



Do NOT shovel or blow snow into the street. This creates a hazardous condition for motorists and may require return trips by the snow plow to clear the street. In addition, State Statutes and Village Ordinances prohibit this action and doing so may result in a fine.

Village Snow Plowing and Removal Policy

Snow plowing is scheduled at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. The Public Works Department will make every effort to clear the streets and make them safe for travel as soon as possible following a snow or ice event. The Village is not responsible for any damage to anything that is placed, built or planted in the Village right-of-way. This includes, but is not limited to, turf, mailboxes, flowers, gravel and trees. This right-of-way area is approximately 15 feet from the curb.

Stay at least 100 feet back from a snowplow in operation of plowing or salting streets. This is for your safety as well as the plow driver's.




While the permits are free of charge, hunters must possess a valid archery license in the State of Wisconsin. The holder of this special permit must abide by all state DNR rules and regulations
